Guide to Rights Restoration & Records



Options Under Arizona Law

Individuals with felony convictions lose certain rights under Arizona law, including **civil rights** (voting, jury service, running for office) and **gun rights**, unless those rights are restored. Arizona has also recently created pathways to **expunge**, **seal**, or **set aside** certain convictions.

Rights Restoration	 All court filings related to rights restoration are free of charge Rights cannot be restored while serving sentence or probation Only need to file one petition per person, no matter how many cases
3 Paths to Restore Rights, Based on Record	 ONE FELONY conviction from a STATE court in ARIZONA Upon completion of incarceration and/or probation and any victim restitution, civil rights are AUTOMATICALLY RESTORED w/ no need to file paperwork ONE FELONY conviction from a STATE court in ANOTHER STATE or any FEDERAL COURT Upon completion of incarceration and/or probation and any victim restitution, civil rights are RESTORED UPON APPLICATION, granted automatically SINGLE FELONY w/ VICTIM RESTITUTION OWED or MULTIPLE FELONIES Upon completion of incarceration and/or probation, MAY PETITION FOR RIGHTS RESTORATION AND THE COURT WILL DECIDE
Specific Rules for Gun Rights	 Rules are same as for Civil Rights, <u>except that</u>: "Dangerous offenses" make gun rights impossible to restore "Serious offenses" add a 10 year waiting period to restore Gun rights lost after a federal felony can be restored via Presidential Pardon
Criminal Records	 MARIJUANA convictions/charges/arrests from a <u>STATE</u> court in <u>ARIZONA</u> can be <u>EXPUNGED IF</u> related to paraphernalia or limited amounts of marijuana Some additional convictions from a <u>STATE</u> court in <u>ARIZONA</u> can be <u>SEALED</u> or <u>SET ASIDE</u> after completion of sentence

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
