PROOF OF ID: WHAT IS ACCEPTABLE ID?

The voter shall present acceptable identification when voting in person:

- Bears the name, address, and photograph of the voter (List 1)
- Two different forms of identification that bear the name and address of the elector (List 2)
- One form of acceptable photo ID with one form of non-photo ID that bears the name and address of the elector (List 3)

VOTING AT THE POLLS: KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

- Voters may bring in someone to assist them in voting as long as they are not a candidate on the ballot, the voter's employer, or an agent of the voter's labor union.
- Voters may bring in guide animals or assistive devices.
- Language assistance is available at many polling places. Navajo language assistance is available on the Navajo Nation, Apache language assistance is available on the San Carlos Apache reservation, and Spanish is available in Yuma, Maricopa, Pima, and Santa Cruz counties.
- Alternative formats are available from many countries. These formats include large print, Braille, and audio recordings.
- Each polling place is equipped with a touch screen machine capable of large print and an audio representation of the ballot.
- Special Election Boards are available in some counties for homebound voters.
- The polls officially close at 7:00 PM and no new voters may get in line after that time. Everyone in line at 7:00 PM will be given the chance to vote.
- Children are allowed into the polling place with you but should not be allowed to disrupt other voters.

Arizona State Elections

Presidential Preference Election - Mar. 19

This an election for voters registered with a specific political party to designate their preference for their party's presidential candidate. Must be registered with the participating party of the Presidential Preference Election. Held once every four years in March or on a date selected by the Governor.

Primary Election - Jul. 30

This election includes federal, state, county and local offices that are up for election. As a Primary Election serves to narrow down each recognized political party's candidates, there are ballots for Republican, Democrat and Libertarian voters. Voters registered as an independent or no party preference must select a Republican or Democrat ballot to participate in the election. Occurs every 2 years, always an even year.

General Elections - Nov. 05

This election includes federal, state, county and local offices that are up for election. The general election is the final election held between nominees of various parties, as well as non-partisan races, ballot propositions and initiatives. Occurs every 2 years, always an even year.

Presidential Preference Elections:

- Mail In: Feb. 21 Mar. 12
- Early In-person: Feb. 21 Mar. 15

Primary Elections

- Mail-In: Jul. 03 Jul. 23
- Early In-person: Jul. 03 Jul. 26

General Elections:

- Mail-In Voting: Oct. 09 Oct. 29
- Early In-person: Oct. 09 Nov. 01

Ballots must be received by election officials by 7:00 p.m. on Election Day.

ADDITIONAL TIPS:

- "Rush Hour" at the polls occurs the first hour that the polls are open, lunchtime, and after 5:00 PM.
- Verify you are at the correct polling place to avoid waiting in line unnecessarily.
- Pre-mark your choices on your sample ballot. Bring this
 to the polls and simply transfer your selections to the
 official ballot at the polling place.
- Update your registration whenever you move so that your information will be correct in the Signature roster.
